I am writing to call your attention to the vital importance of opposing the creation of state-level “strategic Bitcoin reserves” that use the tax authority of our government.

As you may be aware, there is currently a widespread and well-funded push to pressure states to create this type of strategic reserve, as exemplified in [**STATE House/Senate Bill NUMBER introduced on DATE and referred to NAME OF COMMITTEE.**]

Using taxpayer resources to buy Bitcoin through appropriation or borrowing is wholly inappropriate and is a violation of your duty of care to the citizens of this [**state/commonwealth**]. These resources communicate a few key points that are important to understand:

- There is no hard limit of 21 million coins, though this supposed limit is touted as an inflation benefit.
- Government purchases of Bitcoin provide a selling opportunity not otherwise available to large holders of private Bitcoin positions.
- If our state government can afford to buy Bitcoin, it should lower taxes instead.
