Catherine Austin Fitts

Fitts is the publisher of the financial newsletter The Solari Report, author, and former Wall Street investment banker at Dillon, Read & Co. Fitts was also an assistant housing secretary in the Bush administration. She will present her view on (the) changes of (within the) financial system and how a centralized digital financial system could threaten the financial freedom of the public, including (with) the abolition of cash. Fitts will also explain how (the) control of food is essential to financial control. Therefore, it is vital to support local farmers and their production.

Andrew J. Bridgen

Bridgen is a former member of the British Conservative Party. He was expelled from the party for his public criticism of the government's COVID policies, particularly regarding the vaccines, excess mortality, and corruption that reached the highest levels of society during the

pandemic. His criticism and questioning of the matter lead to the fact that the youngest children in Britain did not get the COVD vaccine. Bridgen will talk about how public money is **siphoned** to the pharmaceutical industry including grants/financial support to Moderna in order to build a factory for mRNA production. The bird flu and the new bird flu vaccine will also be on the (his?) agenda.

Steinthor L. Arnarsson

Steinthor is sheep farmer and chairman of the association of young farmers in Iceland. He will discuss the current state and future of agriculture in Iceland, its development (meaning the development in agriculture) and how Icelandic farmers plan (anticipate) to meet (deal with) the challenges (of a new agricultural environment/circumstances) as well as new opportunities. It will be interesting to learn (hear) about the current status of Icelandic farming and farmers after Fitt's talk on the subject, i.e. her views on the relationship (connection) of food control and financial control, and the importance of supporting local farming and farmers.
